

ESSSN Minutes - Term 3, 16 August 2012

Bronte Public School

1. Welcome

The Chair, Jodie Savage – Environmental Education Officer from Waverley Council, welcomed everyone to the meeting and thanked them for coming. She also thanked Bronte Public School for hosting the meeting. Jodie introduced Bronte PS teacher Kylie Maunsell to address the group.

2. Sustainability at Bronte Public School

Kylie explained that the school has recently partnered with Cool Australia (www.ourcoolschool.com.au) to roll out a number of school programs. She showed a variety of videos created by the school in partnership with Cool Australia and encouraged other schools to consider becoming a Flagship Cool Australia school.

Sustainability projects at the school include:

- Keeping 4 chickens on site
- Nude Food lunch every Wednesday (and did whole week of Nude Food during Enviro Week)
- 2 x rainwater tanks
- Vegetable and native gardens
- Composting and worm farming
- Have 'green team' of students that help with projects
- Recently took part in National Tree Day with lots of parental help
- About to start Energy Savers program in the school

3. Council Updates

4. Native Plants & Biodiversity – Group Discussion

Jodie facilitated a group discussion on the various native and biodiversity projects schools had undertaken and the lessons learnt from each project. This was a great time of sharing ideas and resources.

We even received a story in the lead up to the meeting from Renee Ferster Levy who was unable to attend...

Picture a verandah high over a gully in Bellevue Hill, with a beautiful Eucalypt rising from below - its canopy at eye level. For hours every day, a pair of tiny spotted birds with red and yellow highlights could be seen flitting over the leaves pecking at the numerous scale insects for their sweet coating. Each spring these birds would fly to a sandy space and dig a long burrow for their nest, frequent feeding visits ensued once the chicks hatched.

In the garden was a big piece of sandstone bedrock, whose natural hollow would fill with water. Five tiny, long-tailed Fairy-wrens would hop tentatively out of the bushes on the cliff edge to drink and bathe - the bright blue male often on alert for danger. There would be frequent displays with Wrens from neighbouring territories, as there were many in the area. Tiny Silvereyes would also nest in a bushy tree in the garden

The tiny canopy peckers are Spotted Pardalotes, their three-part call was a feature of my childhood, and is now almost absent. There seem to be only two or three families of Fairy-wrens left in the whole of Bellevue Hill, and Silvereyes do pass through but don't seem to stay for long.

This reduction in small bird diversity is being repeated all over the country in urban and semi-urban areas and seems to be due to an increase in aggressive and large birds, and a decrease in dense bushy habitat for small birds' feeding, shelter and nesting.

But we can help! We can:

- 1. Become familiar with our local bird species (e.g. with programs like BirdLife's "Answering the Call")
- 2. Work with the school to identify areas for planting, ideally as part of a master plan

- 3. Select suitable endemic plants using advice from Council and "Guidelines for Creating Bird Habitat" (http://www.birdsinbackyards.net/Guidelines-Creating-Bird-Habitats) to create "structural diversity" i.e. layers from herbs, grasses, small bushes, taller bushes, and creepers not just lawn and trees
- 4. Use tiny tubestock plants they're inexpensive and once have taken, thrive better long term
- 5. Involve students in planning and planting; document/photograph and celebrate every step of the way
- 6. Monitor bird numbers using the Birds in Backyards data input; & sharing results with each other.

Jodie announced that at the Term 4 meeting we will award the inaugural round of the ESSSN Sustainability Awards.

Appendix 2: Native Gardens and Biodiversity Group Discussion Notes

Things that worked well

- Use Randwick Community nursery
- Have a weekly garden club for your native plants as well as your veggies etc
- Make plant markers by taking a photo of the plant, printing on photo paper and adding the common and botanical name. Then laminate and cable tie to a stake to put next to each plant
- On the class phone list at the beginning of the year, provide an option for parents to tick a box if they
 want to be a 'green parent' then you can call on them throughout the year to help with things!
- Enter competitions and use Council support and grants
- Parent involvement and help is important, but getting the kids involved is the best!
- Find ways to help students make strong connections with the gardens e.g. plant a lemon myrtle tree and make lemon myrtle damper as a class. Even if you have to buy lemon myrtle to use in the actual cooking (so you don't strip the plant!) you can still walk down to the tree and discuss its properties as they eat the damper.
- Build gardens into lessons and the curriculum. Use them as much as possible for teaching, and enable other teachers to do the same
- Encourage students to get involved with the gardens in <u>any</u> capacity even if it's just watering the plants near them at lunch time with a cup of water! Let them choose how they want to help (i.e. doesn't have to be 'attend gardening club every week for a whole year' or nothing).
- Sidetrack conversation onto no-waste lunches: have a 'golden lunchbox' prize that gets passed around to the best class each week or take photos of good examples of no-waste lunches as kids bring them in and stick them on a poster/bulletin board where parents can see to give them inspiration

Challenges & Lessons Learnt

- Bush tucker: what we grow in a space all together matters. Indigenous Australian intentionally create small interacting ecosystems of bush tucker plants that they know compliment each other. We shouldn't just throw plants in!
- Bush tucker: try to gain insights from local Elders (try contacting ESORA) and grow what's local to your area
- Bush tucker: Great resource flagged by Ann Kurts at Kensington PS was *D'harawal: seasons and climatic cycles*, compiled by Frances Bodkin; illustrated by Lorraine Robertson (ISBN 9780980481013 pbk.)
- Getting help can be a challenge. Always be looking for people you can raise up in the school community into positions of leadership so you're not reliant on one person
- Building works and BER are/were a challenge!
- Keeping students off gardens can be tricky try using paling/fences and they do learn over time if reinforced enough!
- Consider any drainage issues before you install the garden as can be a pain to fix afterwards!
- Challenging to keep people interested and engaged to ensure garden stays maintained. Try keeping
 working bees short (under 2 hours), always provide food/BBQ or a short workshop on a topic parents
 would be interested in so there's something in it for them, get the general assistant (GA) at the school on
 board to help keep an eye on what needs maintenance.

Native Havens For Schools Project:

With a focus on increasing habitat protection and conservation on public and private land, the **Native Haven's project** is designed to provide advice and support for schools, and others, to work together to encourage the conservation of local plants and animals in school yards and other areas.

What Council provides:

- Council bushland field officer visit to help scope out the biodiversity project
- Council bushland field officer can visit the school to assess an appropriate spot for the native haven
- the Council bushland team can help with determining the number of plants needed
- Council nursery staff can offer advice on plant choice
- schools involved will be eligible to pick up suitable plants from Council's nursery
- Council's bushland team's tools can be borrowed for planting out day.

What schools need to provide:

- submit an outline of your schools biodiversity project to the Bushland team for
- school nominates class/s which will be involved in developing a native haven garden
- nominated class will be available to learn how to assess a suitable site with a Council staff member
- class/s learn how to manage the project what resources they need, what actions need to be carried out
- class/s involved develop a timeline including materials needed, planting out and garden maintenance
- class/s organise tools, plants and preparation for planting day from Council' Bushland team and nursery
- school to organise delivery of mulch through a reputable tree maintenance contractor
- class/s plant out and maintain the garden
